About FNQ Vocational Academy

FNQ Vocational Academy is an exciting regional initiative between TAFE Queensland Cairns, the Department of Education, Trinity Bay State High School, and the Department of Trade, Employment and Training.

The program allows students to study for their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) as well as two Vocational Education and Training qualifications while at high school.

FNQ Vocational Academy aims to provide students with 'real world' skills to gain a head start in the workforce. This is achieved by placing a strong emphasis on work placement and giving students opportunities to seek an apprenticeship or traineeship while completing senior schooling.

Commencing a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship with FNQ Vocational Academy allows school subjects, such as Maths and English, to be timetabled around work placement and training. This ensures a positive transition from school to work.

FNQ Vocational Academy is located at the TAFE Queensland Cairns campus, Eureka Street, Manunda.

This unique program gives young people a head start in developing the knowledge and skills needed to be successful across a broad range of trade careers, while also obtaining their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) and two trade qualifications. FNQ Vocational Academy



Course Outline

The FNQ Vocational Academy program is delivered over two years. Commencing in January of each year, the program provides students a pathway to study senior secondary subjects, participate in trade training, and complete work experience. At the successful completion of the program, students will have completed two vocational qualifications, and obtained their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE). In addition, students will have gained vocational experience and developed the knowledge and skills to be successful in their chosen career. Students will also have the opportunity to gain a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship. Students will enrol in 5 core subjects/courses, delivered by the school (RTO30446):

- > Essential Maths
- > Essential English
- > Social and Community Studies
- > Certificate II in Skills for Work and Vocational Pathways FSK20119
- > Certificate II in Financial Services FNS20120

Students will also enrol in 2 vocational qualifications as outlined on pages 4 & 5, and 11 & 12.



QCE Attainment

The Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) is Queensland's senior secondary schooling qualification. To receive a QCE, you must achieve the set amount of learning, at the set standard, in a set pattern, while meeting literacy and numeracy requirements. Credits are awarded for successful completion of subjects and other recognised study, such as certificate courses. To obtain a QCE, a minimum 20 credits are required.

FNQ Vocational Academy provides the following sample course of study to obtain a QCE.

Uniform, Workwear and PPE

Students are required to wear the FNQ Vocational Academy polo shirt, blue/black pants, and covered shoes while attending school classes. The polo shirt is included in the school fees.

For trade training and work in Construction, Engineering, Plumbing, Electrical, and Automotive, students are required to wear long sleeve work shirts, long navy pants, and steel capped boots.

For trade training and work in Maritime, students are required to wear sun safe clothing, closed in shoes, no singlets or short skirts/shorts. Aviation will be negotiated during orientation.

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) is also required for trade training and work experience and must be purchased prior to the commencement of the training. The school will provide further information on PPE through the enrolment process and funding may be available.

Technology

The FNQ Vocational Academy is a Bring Your Own Device (BYOX) school. Students will require a laptop to access learning material, complete in class tasks and submit required assessment. BYOX options can be discussed with school staff.



Training locations

The program will be delivered at TAFE Queensland Cairns campus (corner of Gatton, Newton, Eureka and Wilkinson Streets, Manunda).

Trade training location will vary depending on the chosen qualification stream and will occur at either the TAFE campus, Marine College (Portsmith), or the Cairns Airport (Cairns North). Work experience will be offsite as negotiated with employers, staff, parents and students.

School staff are located at the TAFE Queensland Cairns campus where all school subjects are delivered. Students have access to TAFE facilities such as the library and canteen.

FNQ Vocational Academy

Timetables and Daily Structure

Students will attend a combination of school, trade training, and work experience. School subjects are structured around trade training and work experience. Each core school subject will be delivered over approximately 3 hours per week, Trade or Vocational Training components (theory and practical) will be delivered over approximately 6 hours a week.

The school day starts at 8:30am and finishes at 2:45pm. Students will have 2 lunch breaks allocated throughout the day. Trade training and work experience start and finish times will vary.

- Semester 1 Students will attend 3 days of schooling, 1 day of trade training, and 1 day of work experience each week
- Semesters 2/3/4 Students will attend 2 days of schooling, 1 day of trade training, and 2 days of work experience each week



Fees and Funding

Fees and Funding The following fees apply to access the program. Year 11 > \$300 Year 12 > \$300

The fees cover the cost for the majority of the program delivery including digital and print resources, excursions, and polo shirt. This is designed to minimise expenditure throughout the year.

A new Career Ready VET in schools program is being developed as part of the Queensland Training Priorities Plan 2024–25 to help school students make good career and training choices, so they can leave school careerready, informed and confident in what their future holds. The Career Ready program will replace the VETiS program and will be further developed in consultation with stakeholders and implemented in a staged approach from 2026. Support and Value Add Programs

During the schooling component, students will participate in a variety of programs to support their personal development, and professional knowledge and skills. This includes mentoring and workshops in areas such as mental health, career education, drug and alcohol awareness, driver training, and financial literacy. FNQ Vocational Academy is committed to ongoing mentoring and pastoral care and the school provides access to Guidance Officers, School Nurse, and Community Education Counsellors to assist students in navigating the world of work and adult learning.

Applications for the FNQ Vocational Academy are open now until November 2025. Interviews will be conducted throughout the year. Successful applicants will be notified as early as possible.

FNQ Vocational Academy commences Semester 1 in line with Education Queensland commencement dates.

Overview

Essential Mathematics' major domains are Number, Data, Location and time, Measurement and Finance. Essential Mathematics benefits students because they develop skills that go beyond the traditional ideas of numeracy. Students develop their conceptual understanding when they undertake tasks that require them to connect mathematical concepts, operations and relations. They learn to recognise definitions, rules and facts from everyday mathematics and data, and to calculate using appropriate mathematical processes. Students interpret and use mathematics to make informed predictions and decisions about personal and financial priorities. This is achieved through an emphasis on estimation, problemsolving and reasoning, which develops students into thinking citizens.

Pathways

A course of study in Essential Mathematics can establish a basis for further education and employment in the fields of trade, industry, business and community services. Students learn within a practical context related to general employment and successful participation in society, drawing on the mathematics used by various professional and industry groups.

By the conclusion of the course of study, students will:

- > select, recall and use facts, rules, definitions and procedures drawn from Number, Data, Location and Time, Measurement and Finance
- > comprehend mathematical concepts and techniques drawn from Number, Data, Location and Time, Measurement and Finance
- > communicate using mathematical, statistical and everyday language and conventions
- > evaluate the reasonableness of solutions

Essential English Applied Senior Subject

Overview

Essential English develops and refines students' understanding of language, literature and literacy to enable them to interact confidently and effectively with others in everyday, community and social contexts. Students recognise language and texts as relevant in their lives now and in the future and learn to understand, accept or challenge the values and attitudes in these texts. Students engage with language and texts to foster skills to communicate confidently and effectively in Standard Australian English in a variety of contemporary contexts and social situations, including every day, social, community, further education and work-related contexts. They choose generic structures, language, language features and technologies to best convey meaning. They develop skills to read for meaning and purpose, and to use critique and appreciate a range of contemporary literary and nonliterary texts. Students use language effectively to produce texts for a variety of purposes and audiences and engage creative and imaginative thinking to explore their own world and the worlds of others. They actively and critically interact with a range of texts, developing an awareness of how the language they engage with positions them and others.

Pathways

A course of study in Essential English promotes open-mindedness, imagination, critical awareness and intellectual flexibility — skills that prepare students for local and global citizenship, and for lifelong learning across a wide range of contexts. Essential English is a workforce pathway subject.

Objectives

By the conclusion of the course of study, students will:

- > use patterns and conventions of genres to achieve particular purposes in cultural contexts and social situations
- > use appropriate roles and relationships with audiences
- > construct and explain representations of identities, places, events and concepts
- > make use of and explain the ways cultural assumptions, attitudes, values and beliefs underpin texts and influence meaning
- > explain how language features and text structures shape meaning and invite particular responses
- > select and use subject matter to support perspectives
- > sequence subject matter and use mode-appropriate cohesive devices to construct coherent texts
- > make mode-appropriate language choices according to register informed by purpose, audience and context
- > use language features to achieve particular purposes across modes.

Social and Community Studies

Applied Senior Subject

Overview

Social & Community Studies focuses on personal development and social skills which lead to self-reliance, self-management and concern for others. It fosters appreciation of, and respect for, cultural diversity and encourages responsible attitudes and behaviours required for effective participation in the community and for thinking critically, creatively and constructively about their future. Students develop personal, interpersonal, and citizenship skills, encompassing social skills, communication skills, respect for and interaction with others, building rapport, problem solving and decision making, self-esteem, self-confidence and resilience, workplace skills, learning and study skills. Students use an inquiry approach in collaborative learning environments to investigate the dynamics of society and the benefits of working with others in the community. They are provided with opportunities to explore and refine personal values and lifestyle choices and to practise, develop and value social, community and workplace participation skills.

Pathways

A course of study in Social & Community Studies can establish a basis for further education and employment, as it helps students develop the skills and attributes necessary in all workplaces.

Objectives

By the conclusion of the course of study, students will:

- > recognise and describe concepts and ideas related to the development of personal, interpersonal and citizenship skills
- > recognise and explain the ways life skills relate to social contexts
- > explain issues and viewpoints related to social investigations
- > organise information and material related to social contexts and issues
- > analyse and compare viewpoints about social contexts and issues
- > apply concepts and ideas to make decisions about social investigations
- > use language conventions and features to communicate ideas and information, according to purposes
- > plan and undertake social investigations
- > communicate the outcomes of social investigations, to suit audiences
- > appraise inquiry processes and the outcomes of social investigations.

The Social and Community Studies course is designed around three core life skills areas which must be covered within every elective topic studied, and be integrated throughout the course.

Assessments

For Social and Community Studies, assessment from Units 3 and 4 is used to determine the student's exit result, and consists of four instruments from at least three different assessment techniques, including:

- > one project or investigation
- > one examination
- > no more than two assessments from each technique.

- > A response to a single task, situation and/or scenario.
- > At least two different components from the following:
 - written: up to 600 words
 - spoken: up to 4 minutes or signed equivalent
 - multimodal: at least 2 different components; up to 5 minutes; up to 6 A4 pages or equivalent digital media

Investigation

- > A response that includes locating and using information beyond students' own knowledge and the data they have been given.
- > Presented in one of the following modes:
 - written: 600-1000 words
 - spoken: up to 7 minutes or signed equivalent
 - multimodal: at least 2 modes delivered at the same time; up to 7 minutes; 10 A4 pages or equivalent digital media

Extended response

- > A technique that assesses the interpretation, analysis/examination and/or evaluation of ideas and information in provided stimulus materials.
- > Presented in one of the following modes:
 - written: 600-1000 words
 - spoken: up to 7 minutes or signed equivalent
 - multimodal: at least 2 modes delivered at the same time; up to 7 minutes;
